In the upcoming days of 6th grade, students will be getting Club Day up and running, and we are also looking forward to our Challenger field trip in October.




discuss with your student how their year is progressing. Ask them about what is going well and what might not be going as well. These conversations can go a long way with bringing students' learning into the home.

Understanding the Lunch Line: A Parent's Guide

Each day, your child is offered a lunch containing the following:

**Meat or Meat Alternate,
Grain,
Fruit, Vegetable
and of course, Milk!**

While the most nutritious lunch contains all of these options, we understand that sometimes our students do not like some of the items we serve. To make our student customers happy, we like to give them the option to decline items they do not want to eat.

Out of the 5 food groups your student is offered, he must choose at least 3 food groups for his meal. One of the food groups must be a fruit or vegetable. Some of the menu choices may count as two food groups such as pizza, nachos, cheeseburger, or chef salad!

Here's an example menu:

Cheeseburger on a Bun
1/2 cup Carrots
1/2 cup French Fries
1/2 cup Peaches
8oz of Milk

So, your child could choose:

Cheeseburger on a Bun and Fries
Carrots, Peaches and Milk
Cheeseburger on Bun, Peaches and Milk

Of course they can take other combinations or all 5 food groups!

The choice is up to them!

If your child comes home and says she didn't get enough to eat at lunch, ask if she is taking all of her fruit and vegetable choices!


Don't forget about breakfast! Join us each morning, breakfast is a great way to kick off your child's day!

Breakfast choices are a little different. Students must take at least 3 of the offered items at breakfast, one must be a fruit or vegetable.







From the Desk of Mr. Culp

As the 2019-2020 school year is off and running, this is an important time to share a timely topic that has consistently been discussed within my household. The topic is cell phone and device usage. With information at the tip of everyone's fingers, phones and devices allow for immediate communication, connectivity, and information gathering. While immediate feedback is part of the culture, this is also reminder for the need of consistent monitoring of our children's phones and devices.

How are parents supposed to handle phones and devices? It is best to keep it simple. Teach students how to be Respectful, Responsible, and Reconnect.

1. **Respect** – Model appropriate times to use a phone or device. In addition, monitor that communication is appropriate. The best advice I have ever heard is *“Would you say it with your grandmother in the room? If not, do not send it via text, social media, or app.”*
2. **Responsible** – Conversations regarding appropriate use are vital. For example, all people need to understand texting while driving is not responsible.
3. **Reconnect** – Find time to talk to each other. Too often I hear comments that people do not know how to talk to one another, so it is important to have face-to-face conversations whenever possible. Conversations during car rides, at the table, or in the evening will help people reconnect with reality and disconnect from the phone or device.

In addition to teaching respectful, responsible, and reconnection use of phone and devices, parents/guardians must stay informed of the latest social media and apps.

Recently the Madill Police Department in Oklahoma shared a list of 15 apps all parents should know. After the information was released, local news outlets and police departments across the country shared the report. While apps are beneficial, some apps can put children in a compromising position when personal information is shared.

Here's the list:

- **MeetMe:** The dating social media app allows people to connect based on location. Users are encouraged to meet each other in person.
- **WhatsApp:** The messaging app allows users to send texts, video calls, and voicemails to other people. It also includes photo sharing and video chat capabilities.
- **Bumble:** Similar to Tinder, but requires women to make the first contact. Police said kids and teens have been known to make fake accounts and lie about their age.
- **Live.Me:** A geolocation-based live-streaming app that allows users to find a broadcaster's location. Police said users can earn “coins” to “pay” minors for photos.
- **Ask.FM:** The app lets users ask anonymous questions. Police said it can be used for cyberbullying.
- **Grindr:** A dating app geared toward the LGBTQ community. Users can chat, share photos and meet based on their phones' location.
- **TikTok:** The app lets users create and share short videos. Police said it's popular with kids and has limited privacy controls. Users are vulnerable to cyberbullying and explicit content.
- **Snapchat:** Snapchat remains one of the world's most popular social media apps. Users are supposed to be able to send photos/videos that will later disappear, but features like “stories” allow people to share content for up to a day. Snapchat also allows other users to see your location.

- **Holla:** A video chat app that allows users to meet people from all over the world. According to some reviews, users could encounter explicit content, racial slurs, profanity and more.
- **Calculator+:** The innocuous-looking app appears to be a standard calculator but allows users to hide photos, videos and files they don't want other people to see.
- **Skout:** The location-based dating app doesn't allow users 17 and under to share private photos, but kids could easily create an account by lying about their age.
- **Badoo:** The dating and social media app is meant to be for adults, but teens have been known to create accounts. Users can chat and share photos and videos based on location.
- **Kik:** The app allows users to send direct messages to other users. Kids can use it to bypass traditional text messaging.
- **Whisper:** The anonymous social network lets users share information with strangers. It also reveals a user's location so people can meet each other.
- **Hot or Not:** The "hookup" app lets users rate profiles, check out people in their area and chat with strangers.

MEETME



MEETME is a dating social media app that allows users to connect with people based on geographic proximity. As the app's users are encouraged to meet each other in person.

GRINDR



GRINDR is a dating app geared towards gay, bi and transgender people. The app gives users options to chat, share photos and meet up based on a smart phones GPS.

SKOUT



SKOUT is a location-based dating app and website. While users under 17 years old are unable to share private photos, kids can easily create an account with an older age.

WHATSAPP



WHATSAPP is a popular messaging app that allows users to send texts, photos, voicemails, and make calls and video chats

TIKTOK



TIKTOK is a new mobile device app popular with kids used for creating and sharing short videos. With very limited privacy controls, users are vulnerable to cyber bullying and explicit content.

BADBOO



BADBOO is a dating and social networking app where users can chat, share photos and videos and connect based on location. While the app is intended for adults only, teens are known to create profiles.

BUMBLE



BUMBLE is similar to the popular dating app "Tinder" however, it requires women to make the first contact. Kids have been known to use BUMBLE to create fake accounts and falsify their age.

SNAPCHAT



SNAPCHAT is one of the most popular apps in recent years. While the app promises users can take a photo/video and it will disappear, new features including "stories" allows users to view content for up to 24 hours. Snapchat also allows users to see your location.

KIK



KIK allows anyone to contact and direct message to your child. Kids can bypass traditional text messaging features. KIK gives users unlimited access to anyone, anywhere, anytime.

LIVEME



LIVE.ME is a live-streaming video app that uses geolocation to share videos so users can find out a broadcaster's exact location. Users can earn "coins" as a way to "pay" minors for photos.

HOLLA



HOLLA is a self-proclaimed "addicting" video chat app that allows users to meet people all over the world in just seconds. Reviewers say they have been confronted with racial slurs, explicit content, and more.

WHISPER




WHISPER is an anonymous social network that promotes sharing secrets with strangers. It also reveals a user's location so people can meet up.

ASK.FM



ASK.FM is known for cyber bullying. The app encourages users to allow anonymous people to ask them questions.

CALCULATOR%



CALCULATOR% is only one of SEVERAL secret apps used to hide photos, videos, files, and browser history.

HOT OR NOT



HOT OR NOT encourages users to rate your profile, check out people in their area, and chat with strangers. The goal of this app is to hook up.
