# Tri-County FFA has a Successful Day

The Tri-County FFA chapter had an eventful and successful day Saturday, September 16th. Members competed in the State Livestock Skillathon, Purdue Soils Invite, State Dairy Foods, and State Meats contests.

The State Livestock Skillathon team consisted of Blayne Vandevveer, Ashley Peterson, Courtney Lehe, and Tyler Vandevveer. The team received an overall ranking of fifth. Livestock Skillathon contestants must identify feed, equipment, retail meat cuts and judge livestock, meat, wool and hay. They are also tested on their livestock knowledge.

A total of 11 members went to the Purdue Soils Invite. The team of Sydney Rust, Andy Douglas, Abby Kilmer, and Tyler Kilmer were ranked 13th. The team of Ana Douglas, Bailey Kyle, Darian Pinkerton, and Alyssa Kirby were ranked 20th. The final team that went consisted of Zach Brouhard, Justin Kilmer, and Lily Sterk were ranked 23rd. Soils judges have to determine the color, texture, slope, drainage and landform of four sites and recommend home construction, septic and farming practices for each site.

Members Brittany Gonzales, Courtney Lehe, Savannah Williams, Abby Kilmer and Jaden Myers competed in the State Dairy Foods contest. Gonzales, Lehe, Williams, and Kilmer were on a team and received third place. The team was led by Lehe who received fifth place individual and Kilmer who received seventh place individual. Myers competed as an individual in the Junior Production Division and received 15th. Dairy Foods includes cheese identification, fat content of milk determination, dairy/non dairy selection, California Mastitis Test results reading and a knowledge test.

The final contest Tri-County took members to was the State Meats contest. Blake Peterson, Chase Sterns, Leah Schneider, Tyler Vandevveer, Ashley Seigfred, and Lane Cochran also competed in this contest. The team of Peterson, Sterns, Schneider, and Vandevveer received fourth place at the contest in the 4-H division. Cochran competed as an individual in the 4-H division and received 20th. Siegfred competed as an individual in the FFA division and received 18th. In meats judging, contestants identify retail cuts, judge retail, wholesale and carcasses and present their oral reasons to a judge.

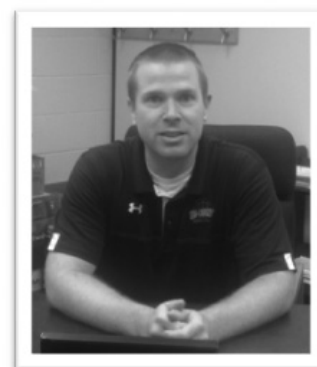

All of our students are immersed in a variety of new enrichment opportunities that will prepare them to surpass any challenge ahead of them in their lives. I am proud to be a part of an excellent team that understands the importance of integrating STEAM education within the curriculum. We are integrating Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math in all academic areas to provide problem solving and collaborative experiences that provide rigor, relevance, and relationships to learning.



Our teachers are working in teams every week to ensure we are providing each and every student targeted and purposeful STEAM education. Each class engages in our STEAM Academy every week where they are empowered to embrace challenges in small teams, and use the Engineering Design Process to Ask, Imagine, Plan, Create, and Improve.

## ***From The Desk of Dr. Goad***

Nobel Prize winner and American author John Steinbeck once wrote “Perhaps it takes courage to raise children...” As a parent myself, thankful my children are adults, I understand the reality of this quote. As parents, we all want the same thing, we want what is best for our children. It is difficult then, to see our kids struggle. Our first inclination is to step in and help. It takes courage to step back and let the struggle happen. However, it is through struggle our children and our students learn.

Indulge me in a story of my daughter. At six years old she had developed a young passion for basketball. She watched it, she practiced it, she played it, she talked about it, and she dreamed about (probably because she slept with a basketball at her side). At six years old she was limited in her skills, although she had perfected a right handed layup. In the drive way, every day and night, she would approach the basket, jump off her left foot, extend her right arm, aim for the ‘square’ and score. This repetitive motion became second nature to her, as her muscles remembered the sequence of movement.

Then... she joined her first organized team and came home from practice in tears because her coach had the girls do a drill of a left handed layup and she couldn’t do it. As a parent I wanted to help her, I didn’t want to see her cry, I didn’t want to see her struggle, I didn’t want her to feel she was the only one who couldn’t do it. However, I couldn’t do it for her. What I could do was tell her “you can’t do it, yet”. I reminded her of how she learned to complete her right handed shot and that it would take the same determination, perseverance, and effort for this new skill. So, she spent hours and days outside with her basketball. Trying over and over again to make a left handed layup. And over and over again she missed. Until one day, I vividly remember being in the kitchen preparing dinner when I heard a scream come from the driveway. My immediate thought was a trip to the emergency room was in our future. As I ran to see what damage had been done, my daughter was laying on the ground, arms stretched to the sky, with the basketball spinning in her hands. She joyfully announced, “I made a left handed layup!”

Whether in kindergarten or a senior, learning new skills in the classroom is no different than learning to make a layup. It’s a struggle. If our children understand that they simply haven’t learned the skill YET they are much more inclined to continue the journey. Getting to YET requires patience, perseverance, effort, and trust.

Here are some things you can do at home to encourage the YET mindset:

- Encourage your child to take risks and tackle new challenges at school.
- Praise your child not for the ease with which he or she learns a concept but for the amount of effort put into learning it.
- Communicate with your child’s teacher if the material is too easy for your child.
- When your child is working on a new skill and in frustration says “I can’t do this!” simply reply “YET”.
- Emphasize perseverance and effort in extracurricular activities. For example, “I’m proud of how much effort you put into that football game” instead of “I’m proud of the touchdown you scored.”

I’ll leave you with this quote which I recently heard at an educational conference “Let students struggle. Don’t rob them of the “I got it!” moment. (Dockterman, 2015)

<b>Understanding the Lunch Line: A Parent's Guide</b>	
Each day, your child is offered a lunch containing the following:  <b>Meat or Meat Alternate, Grain, Fruit, Vegetable and of course, Milk!</b>	While the most nutritious lunch contains <u>all</u> of these options, we understand that sometimes our students do not like some of the items we serve. To make our student customers happy, we like to give them the option to decline items they do not want to eat.
Out of the 5 food groups your student is offered, he must choose <u>at least</u> 3 food groups for his meal. One of the food groups <u>must</u> be a fruit or vegetable. Some of the menu choices may count as two food groups such as pizza, nachos, cheeseburger, or chef salad!	
<b>Here's an example menu:</b> Cheeseburger on a Bun 1/2 cup Carrots 1/2 cup French Fries 1/2 cup Peaches 8oz of Milk	<b>So, your child could choose:</b> Cheeseburger on a Bun and Fries Carrots, Peaches and Milk Cheeseburger on Bun, Peaches and Milk <b>Of course they can take other combinations or <u>all 5 food groups</u>!</b> <b>The choice is up to them!</b>
If your child comes home and says she didn't get enough to eat at lunch, ask if she is taking all of her fruit and vegetable choices!	
<b>Don't forget about breakfast!</b> Starting at 7:30 each morning, breakfast is a great way to kick off your child's day!	Breakfast choices are a little different. Students must take at least 3 of the offered items at breakfast, one must be a fruit or vegetable.

## **Nurse's Notes Fall 2017**

Welcome back for another great year at Tri County!!

We have a new nurse this year. Mrs. Alberts is pursuing another career path. I'm so excited to have Sara Arvin RN; BSN, as a part of the nursing department. She comes to us with excellent nursing skills and a wide range of nursing experience.

Every year we are required to do vision screening of 1st; 3rd; 5th and 8th grade students. This year we will be having the Lions Club do that screening for us. They will also screen the Developmental Kindergarten and the Kindergarten classes, so we can be proactive in identifying vision problems early. The students in the DK & Kindergarten classes will be bringing home a consent form for your signature. The consent will allow the Lions Club to use the special KID SIGHT camera for their screening. There is no cost for the Lions Club to do these screenings for us and I'm so thrilled they agreed to come here.

There are some changes coming up with immunizations for next year.

**ALL** students will be required to have "2" Hepatitis A immunizations, and there is a 6 month waiting period between injections. Many of our students already have them, but many do not. Please check your child's immunization record.

Students entering the 12th grade will need a 2nd Meningitis immunization and will now also need "2" Meningitis "B" immunizations. There is a waiting period of at least 1 month between the Men B injections. We will be mentioning immunizations throughout the year, to help you remember to get them done.
