The registration days for the Tri-County Primary, Tri-County Intermediate, and Tri-County Junior/Senior High Schools will be **Monday, July 29, 2019, and Tuesday, July 30, 2019**. All registrations will be done at Tri-County Junior/Senior High School. **Monday, July 29, 2019, and Tuesday, July 30, 2019, registration times will be from 1:00 p.m. – 8:00 p.m. on Monday, July 29, and Tuesday, July 30, registration times will be from 8:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m.**

They are dismissed at 2:55 p.m. At the Junior/Senior High School the first block of the day begins at 8:10 a.m. with dismissal at 3:10 p.m.

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Tri-County School Corporation offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs **\$1.00**; lunch costs **\$2.70, for grades K-6 and \$2.80 for grades 7-12. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals.** Reduced price is **\$.30** for breakfast and **\$.40** for lunch. This packet includes an application for free or reduced price meal benefits, and a set of detailed instructions. Below are some common questions and answers to help you with the application process.

1. WHO CAN GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS?

- All children in households receiving benefits from SNAP (Food Stamps) or TANF, are eligible for free meals.
- Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
- Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.
- Children may receive free or reduced price meals if your household's income is within the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits on this chart.

2. HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILDREN QUALIFY AS HOMELESS, MIGRANT, OR RUNAWAY? Do the members of your household lack a permanent address? Are you staying together in a shelter, hotel, or other temporary housing arrangement? Does your family relocate on a seasonal basis? Are any children living with you who have chosen to leave their prior family or household? If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail **Mr. Patrick Culp, Superintendent, @ 219-279-2418 or culpp@trico.k12.in.us**
3. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD? No. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: **Ms. Cheri Frantz, Food Director, @ 219-279-2105 or frantzc@trico.k12.in.us**
4. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE ALREADY APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? No, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. If any children in your household were missing from your eligibility notification, contact **Ms. Cheri Frantz, Food Director, @ 219-279-2105 or frantzc@trico.k12.in.us** immediately.
5. CAN I APPLY ONLINE? **No!**
6. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT A NEW ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year through **September 20, 2019**. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year. If you do not send in a new application that is approved by the school or you have not been notified that your child is eligible for free meals, your child will be charged the full price of meals.

7. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
 8. WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED? Yes. We may also ask you to send written proof of the household income you report.
 9. IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
 10. WHAT IF I DISAGREE WITH THE SCHOOL'S DECISION ABOUT MY APPLICATION? You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: **Mr. Patrick Culp, Superintendent, 105 N 2nd Street; Wolcott, IN 47995, Phone (219) 279-2418, culpp@trico.k12.in.us**
 11. MAY I APPLY IF SOMEONE IN MY HOUSEHOLD IS NOT A U.S. CITIZEN? Yes. You, your children, or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to apply for free or reduced price meals.
 12. WHAT IF MY INCOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE SAME? List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
 13. WHAT IF SOME HOUSEHOLD MEMBERS HAVE NO INCOME TO REPORT? Household members may not receive some types of income we ask you to report on the application, or may not receive income at all. Whenever this happens, please write a 0 in the field. However, if any income fields are left empty or blank, those will also be counted as zeroes. Please be careful when leaving income fields blank, as we will assume you meant to do so.
 14. WE ARE IN THE MILITARY. DO WE REPORT OUR INCOME DIFFERENTLY? Your basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. If you get any cash value allowances for off-base housing, food, or clothing, it must also be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is also excluded from income.
 15. WHAT IF THERE ISN'T ENOUGH SPACE ON THE APPLICATION FOR MY FAMILY? List any additional household members on a separate piece of paper, and attach it to your application. Contact **any of the schools** to receive a second application.
 16. MY FAMILY NEEDS MORE HELP. ARE THERE OTHER PROGRAMS WE MIGHT APPLY FOR? To find out how to apply for SNAP (Food Stamp) or other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or call **1-800-403-0864**.

Pesticide Application Notice

Periodically throughout the year, it may be necessary that pesticides be applied to external and internal areas of the school building and grounds. If you wish to be given notice of such pesticide applications, please notify the principal of the building. You will be given a form to fill out and will be notified of any pesticide application with at least a 48-hour notice. Pesticide applications will not be done when children, staff members or any other people are present in the area that is to be sprayed.

SCHOOL DELAYS, CLOSINGS and EARLY DISMISSAL

(PLEASE KEEP FOR FUTURE REFERENCE)

There are times when school must be delayed or closed due to inclement weather or other emergencies. When this becomes necessary, the Superintendent will make the decision as early as possible to allow parents to make alternative plans. Once the decision is made a School Messenger alert call will be sent out to all parents/stakeholders who have signed up for this service. You can do so by signing up during school registration. Parents of elementary students are asked to send a note to your child's teacher and bus driver, if he or she rides a bus, explaining your family's plan. Parents of Junior/Senior High School students should discuss this plan with their child(ren).

Nurses Notes

Welcome back to another year. It promises to be a great year!!

We will be looking closely at Immunization Compliance during the next couple of weeks. The incoming Kindergarteners, the 6th Graders and the Seniors were notified by letter last spring, stating the immunizations needed to start school this fall.

The Meningitis B immunization is currently not required by the state, however, we encourage you to consider this for your teens. It is a series of two injections, 1 mo. apart. The disease has vague symptoms, has very serious side effects, and in some instances can even result in death. **ALL** Indiana colleges and Universities require this series as part of the requirements to attend.

The White County Health Department is now able to provide immunizations to everyone. They now have the ability to bill insurance companies for immunizations. They still will give immunizations as before, to those with Medicaid and those who do not have insurance coverage. Please call for an appointment: 574-583-1502. They will be moving into a new office this summer, located in the medical building behind Kroger in Monticello.

This year we will be sending a paper home with students who become ill at school with vomiting, diarrhea, fever, pink eye and rashes, etc. It will state the guidelines for when they may return to school. We will also have a new handout that will go home with any student with Head Lice.

Medications can be given at school, as we have done in the past. **ALL** medications will require signed medication request, in order for us to give them. **ALL** medications must be in the original bottle or container and must have a valid date. **ALL** Prescription Medications must have the pharmacy label in place.

We are both looking forward to a wonderful and healthy year!!


