
THE BOOK FAIR IS COMING TO TRI-COUNTY PRIMARY!

At times, the question is asked, what do teachers do every Monday? The answer is rather simple on the surface, yet complex in action.

Each Monday, the Tri-County teachers participate in Professional Learning Communities (PLC). A PLC is an ongoing process in which educators work collaboratively to achieve better results for students. There is ample evidence to support the fact the Professional Learning Community process is not only effective in improving one school in a district, but it is also a powerful tool for districtwide school improvement (Eaker, Keating, Hagadone, Rhoades Leading PLCs At Work (2021), pg 1. The staff of the Tri-County School Corporation believes all students can learn at a high level, therefore, we believe in three tenets:

- The Tri-County staff takes collective responsibility to ensure that all students learn.
- The Tri-County staff collaborate because we believe no one teacher holds the key to ensure learning for all students.
- The Tri-County staff will align all school operations with the focus on student learning.

In order to remain focused on student learning, the Tri-County staff continuously ask ourselves four (4) PLC questions.

- 1. What do students need to know and be able to do?
- 2. How will we know when students have learned it?
- 3. What will we do when students have not learned it?
- 4. What will we do when students already know it?

Professional Learning Communities are more than just professional development. PLCs are intentionally designed to support student learning, thus allowing Tri-County Corporation to be able to provide your child the best education possible from the best small rural school in the state. So, when Monday morning rolls around, and your kids may be sleeping in a little later, just remember our teachers are still showing up early, working hard to do what they can to give your child the best educational opportunities possible.

NOTES FROM THE NURSE

The nurse's office has been a busy place since school has started. We have already seen all kinds of illnesses this school year. From hand, foot, and mouth disease, to ear infections, to strep throat, RSV, to the flu, common colds, and a few COVID cases. These illnesses are here much earlier than we see them in a typical school year. While there is a great amount of focus on COVID, children are still prone to become infected with multiple illnesses. We ask for your help in keeping children home when they are not feeling well. Always feel free to contact your building nurse when you are uncertain whether or not a student should be attending school, or for how long you should keep an ill child home. As a general rule, children should not return to school until symptom free and fever free without the use of fever reducing medications for 24 hours. Keeping ill children home and frequent hand washing are 2 of the best ways to help us reduce the spread of childhood illnesses. We appreciate your cooperation.

The Lion's Club will be coming to assist us with vision screening on September 21st. We will be assessing kindergarten, 1st grade, 3rd, 5th grade, and 8th grade. The nurses will contact you if your child does not pass their screening exam. We have also been working closely with our school speech-language pathologist to conduct hearing screenings for grades kindergarten, 1st, 4th, 7th, and 10th grade.

TCP and TCI will be celebrating Red Ribbon week October 25-October 29th. During this week we will be talking with the students about Just Saying No to Drugs. Mrs. Arvin will begin an educational program for the 6th graders at TCI called CATCH my Breath. It is about the dangers of vaping. It consists of 4 one hour sessions discussing several topics. It will cover the health hazards of e-cigarettes, and discuss why people begin using them. It will also cover some positive alternatives and ways the advertising industry makes e-cigarettes seem harmless. They will learn about ways to resist peer pressure and will make their own slogan and warning label.
