7. Addition of a full-time Art instructor at TCHS and a 2nd Business instructor.

In addition to fulfilling the campaign promises, the referendum has supported other positions within the TriCounty School Corporation.

- Full-time Counselor at TCP and TCI.
- Addition of 2nd Special Education Instructor at TCI.
- Addition of English-Language Learner Instructor.

In total, referendum funds support 16 Teachers and 15 support staff across TCSC. We continue to keep our referendum campaign promises to the Tri-County Community.
In addition to the staffing promises fulfilled, the Tri-County School Corporation promised to keep the referendum and debt service tax rate neutral for our taxpayers. The operations referendum remains important to help ensure no deficit spending occurs within the district.

The additional funds from the referendum provide our students with the best educational programs with the most impactful instruction in our schools. When our students are successful, our Remington and Wolcott communities become more vibrant and thriving towns benefiting our property and business owners.
